


When do I prune Crape Myrtles in Georgia?

You can prune Crape Myrtles any time from the late winter to early spring. What is most important is that it is pruned before spring growth begins. Everywhere you prune the plant there will be new growth and flowers. Do not prune crape myrtle in early fall before the first frost. This will possibly expose the bush or tree to disease.



Many people, including landscapers, each winter do what is called "Crape Murder". They cut the branches evenly across the tree at the knuckle. **WRONG**. Crape myrtle is a forgiving plant and will still bloom even after "crape murder". But this severe pruning leads to a vigorous growth which can cause disease and insect problems. Matter of fact, Crape myrtles do not have to be pruned at all but if you have to prune there is a good way to trim your crape myrtle. You want to give the plant a, what I call, an umbrella shape. Shorter branches on the outer edges and taller branches in the middle.

First you need to know what kind of variety you have since some varieties grow into trees and others into shrubs. Knowing which variety, you have will determine how you prune your plant.

If you have a tree-form crape myrtle, you can prune by doing the following; remove sprouts near the ground and along the trunk. These are called suckers. Remove any interior sprouts that travel crosswise other branches. You should not prune any sprouts that are vertical or leaning toward the outside of the tree. Cut any sprouts back to the diameter of $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{1}{4}$ inch.



If you have a shrub-form crape myrtle, just shape it as you like. If you want it to be six feet high in the summer, trim back in the winter to four to five feet.
