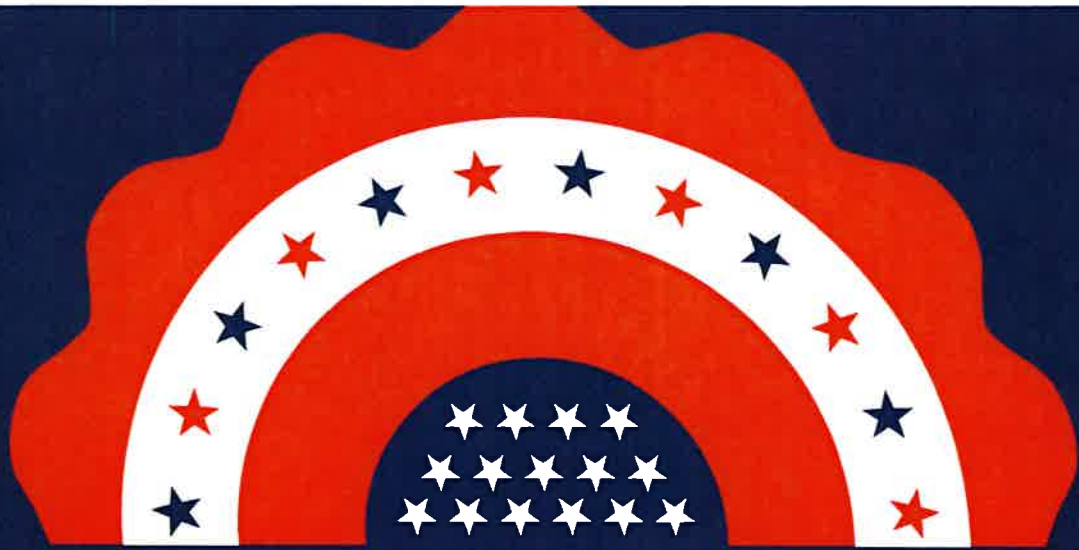

# DISASTER SUPPLY KIT CHECKLIST



## General

- Two week minimum supply of medication, regularly used medical supplies, and a list of allergies
- A list of the style, serial number, and manufacturer information of required medical devices
- Batteries
- Flashlights  
*Do not use candles*
- NOAA Weather Radio  
*Battery operated or hand cranked*
- Cash  
*Banks and ATMs may not be available after a storm*
- Cell phone chargers
- Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children

## Phone Numbers

- Maintain a list of important phone numbers including:  
*County emergency management office, evacuation sites, doctors, banks, schools, veterinarian, a number for out of town contacts, friends and family*

## Clothing

- Rain gear such as jackets, hats, umbrellas and rain boots
- Sturdy shoes or boots and work gloves

## Special Needs Items

- Specialty items for infants, small children, the elderly, and family members with disabilities

## First Aid

- First Aid Manual
- Sterile adhesive bandages of different sizes
- Sterile gauze pads
- Hypoallergenic adhesive tape
- Triangular bandages
- Scissors
- Tweezers
- Sewing needle
- Moistened towelettes
- Antiseptic
- Disinfectant wipes
- Hand sanitizer
- Thermometer
- Tube of petroleum jelly
- Safety pins
- Soap
- Latex gloves
- Sunscreen
- Aspirin or other pain reliever
- Anti-diarrheal medicine
- Antacid
- Laxative
- Cotton balls
- Q-tips

## Food and Water

- Food  
*Nonperishable packaged or canned food and beverages, snack foods, juices, baby food, and any special dietary items to last at least 7 days*
- Water  
*1 gallon per person per day*
- Non-electric can opener
- Paper plates
- Napkins
- Plastic cups
- Utensils

## Important Documents

- Insurance cards
- Medical records
- Banking information
- Credit card numbers
- Copies of social security cards
- Copies of birth and/or marriage certificates
- Other personal documents
- Set of car, house, and office keys
- Service animal I.D., veterinary records, and proof of ownership
- Information about where you receive medication, the name of the drug, and dosage
- Copy of Will

*\*Items should be kept in a water proof container*

## Vehicle

- Keep your motor vehicle tanks filled with gasoline

## Pet Care Items

- Pet food and water to last at least 7 days
- Proper identification
- Medical records/microchip information
- A carrier or cage
- Muzzle and leash
- Water and food bowls
- Medications
- Supplies for your service animal

## Garden Corner

One of my favorite flowers/bush is hibiscus. You can plant them in the ground or place in a large planter. These plants come in many different colors and styles, even a double flower.



If you should decide to plant in your garden, plant them together. They can grow up to 15 feet high and really don't need a lot of effort to care for. They like soil that is slightly acidic so add peat moss to the soil and plant two to three feet from each other. They need moist soil but also need good drainage. They require direct sunlight, at least five to six hours a day. They can be in partial sunlight but expect less blooms. Keep them in 60 to 90-degree temperatures. Fertilize using a liquid fertilizer that is high in potassium but low in phosphorus. Phosphorus is a mineral that eventually

kills hibiscus. A great way to encourage growth is to add compost bark or worm casings to soil once a year or more. Warning, if the temperature drops outside below 32 degrees expect your plant to probably die. You can move it indoors but that means digging up and potting the plant. This is why I plant mine in large pots. Oh, and don't plant them in pots that are clay. Hibiscus don't like clay since clay pots make the soil too alkaline.



I find it easier to grow Hibiscus in containers. This makes it easier to be moved in from the cold. Make sure that the planter drains well and use stone as opposed to clay for the reason I stated above.



A common problem is overwatering. If you find the leaves to be turning yellow, especially in winter, you are watering too much. Sometimes you can get aphids, mites or whiteflies. If this occurs use mild soap to the leaves and wipe with damp clean cloth.

You can deadhead your plants but it is not necessary to do so to get new blooms. If you see seed pods form, do cut those off. They don't require pruning but you can prune if you wish. Early spring is recommended. You can cut back your plant to a height one third its growth to encourage more blooms. Cuts should be made above leaves or buds to encourage branching. This is a beautiful plant to add to your garden.
